

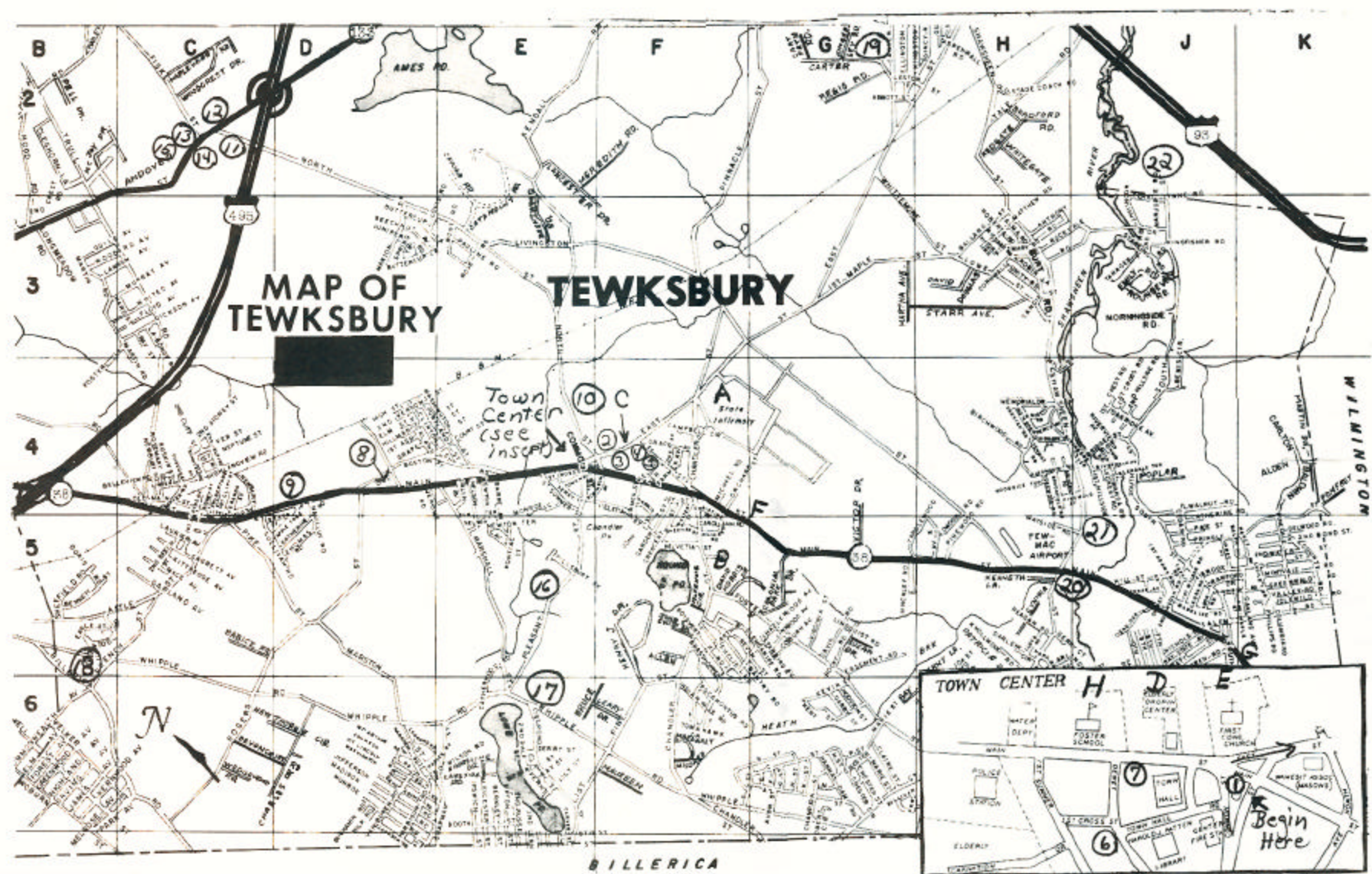
## HOME OF DEMOCRACY - THE NEW ENGLAND TOWN - TEWKSBURY, MASSACHUSETTS

1. **BANDSTAND**, Standing on "The Common" at the intersection of Main and Pleasant Streets this town landmark, built in 1891, is truly at the Center of the Community. It is surrounded by the Congregational Church, Senior Citizen Centre, Town Hall, Fire Station and many of the town's oldest homes.
2. **REV. SAMPSON SPAULDING HOMESTEAD**, 60 East Street, Built in 1736 by Rev. Spaulding first minister of the Congregational Church. Between 1854-1861, during the tenure of office of postmaster Benjamin Spaulding, the town's postoffice was located here.
3. **THE STONE HOUSE**, 55 East Street, Built around 1850. The Postoffice was located here in 1893.
4. **SECOND GEORGE LEE HOUSE**, corner East and Lee Streets, owner of the Tannery.
5. **THE GEORGE LEE HOUSE**, Site of Lee's Tannery, 53 Lee Street. Built in 1805. Lee's Tannery started here by George Lee in 1839. William Lee succeeded his father and operated the Tannery until the early 1890's. Gloves, moccasins, and belt leathers were manufactured here. Later a cabinet maker was located here.

6. **REAR WING OF DR. ENOCH FOSTER HOUSE**, which originally stood on the site now occupied by the Town Hall. When the main part of the house was torn down, this wing was moved to its present site at 43 Dewey St.
7. **THE BROWN TAVERN**, Located at 993 Main Street to the right of the Town Hall was built about 1740 and served as a Tavern for many years. In the early years, traveling people stopped here, particularly traveling between New Hampshire and Boston. Often they traded for goods they could not raise or raise themselves.
8. **COLONEL RUSSELL MEARS HOUSE**, 592 Main Street, Built in 1780 by this Revolutionary War Soldier while on leave from his regiment.
9. **THE HARDY HOMESTEAD**, 496 Main Street, Built in 1740, at one time this was a half-way house between New Hampshire and Boston.
10. **PATTEN'S GREENHOUSE**, Located on North Street, and established in 1867 as one of Tewksbury's first industries. The first Patten Greenhouse was moved from Lowell by Marcellus A. Patten. The Lowell Greenhouse was dismantled and brought to Tewksbury by horse and wagon. The move took two years.

11. **THE BATTLES HOUSE**, 1002 North Street, 1742. One of the town's oldest houses. After 1847 this was a market farm and apple orchard.
12. **JONATHAN CLARK HOMESTEAD**, 1534 Andover Street, 1800. Occupied for many generations by his descendants.
13. **FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH**, Originated in 1843 with 68 members on land donated by Jefferson Farmer. In 1867 it was moved to its present site on land donated by Jesse L. Trull.
14. **ELLA FLEMING SCHOOL**, 1859. Originally there were two separate entrances - one for the girls and one for the boys. There also were high board fences on each side for the separate playgrounds.
15. **LIFE FARMER HOMESTEAD**, 1472 Andover Street, A beautiful example of a more elaborate home of this time. It was built in 1802.
16. **MARSHALL HOMESTEAD**, 379 Pleasant Street, Built in 1728. The oldest home in Tewksbury is still occupied by descendants of the original family.

17. **CROSBY CANNING FACTORY**, Located at 922 Whipple Road, this lovely residence was once owned by Mr. George Crosby where he was the first to successfully can dried beef and squash in this country. These and other vegetables had a ready market all over the country and many local people found it convenient to have their own vegetables canned here for personal use.
18. **OSTERMAN'S DAIRY**, Located at 98 North Billerica Road and French Street. In business since 1872 until just recently. Producers of milk and cream from their own "tuberculin tested herd."
19. **G. FRENCH HOMESTEAD**, 27 Carter Street, around 1800. Typical New England farmhouse once owned by one of Tewksbury's first settlers.
20. **1714. OLDEST GRAVE STONE IN TEWKSBURY**. Dr. John Kitterig 1645-1714. Located at the Shawshen Street Cemetery. This land was Kittredge Meadow land. (Kitterig-Kittredge)
21. **A COLONIAL FARMHOUSE**, 721 Shawshen Street, Center entrance colonial farmhouse with three chimneys.
22. **BENJAMIN BURIT HOMESTEAD**, 1800, 1304 South Street. One of the few surviving homesteads in South Tewksbury.
